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# ANTECEDENTS OF CUSTOMER RETENTION: EVIDENCE FROM MOBIL PETROL STATIONS IN IKORODU AREA OF LAGOS STATE, NIGERIA

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#### **Abstract**

The intense competition and low margins in the retail petrol market of Nigeria's downstream petroleum sector have made customer retention very important in the market. This research examined the antecedents of customer retention in Nigeria's petrol stations. Using the research instrument of questionnaire, data were collected from a valid sample of 600 respondents at four outlets of Mobil at Ikorodu, Lagos State, Nigeria. Using SPSS 23, data analysis was undertaken by a Multiple Regression Model to test the three research Hypotheses. The results supported all the three hypotheses in a significant way. Brand image, service quality, and Trust have significant effects on customer retention in Mobil Petrol Stations. Brand image has the strongest effect on customer retention. The other two constructs also have robust effects on customer retention. The findings contribute to the scarce literature on customer retention in the context of Nigeria's retail petrol market. It was concluded that brand image, service quality, and Trust are very important in retaining customers of petrol stations. The practical implications of the findings for managers and scholars are also highlighted in the paper.

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**INTRODUCTION** 

Customer retention (or loyalty) is crucial to the overall success of marketing efforts in both the

manufacturing and services industries. Success and profitability are achieved not by merely

acquiring customers, but by forging lasting and mutually beneficial relationships with customers

(Aminu, 2012). A Customer acquisition and retention (loyalty) are central to relationship

marketing (Aminu, 2022). Customer retention can be defined as how a company maintains the

existing customers' base by establishing good relations with all who buy the company's product

(Kotler, Armstrong, Wong, & Saunders, 2008). Customer retention reduces marketing and

operational costs and increases a company's sales revenues, profits, and market shares (Ang &

Buttle, 2006; Artun & Levin, 2015; Athanasopoulou, 2009; Lin & Wu, 2011; Dawkins & Reichheld,

1990; Mark, 2014; Reichheld, 1996). Therefore, interests of researchers and authors in this

important marketing subject in a number of markets are ever increasing.

However, it is observed that, generally, research on customer retention, especially in Nigeria's

downstream petroleum sector, is scanty. Extant research on the downstream sector has

examined marketing factors appealing to consumers in choosing self service petrol station in

Bangkok (Lertyingyot, 2010); consumer satisfaction and loyalty in a Korean gas station (Lee, Huh,

& Jeon, 2012); customer satisfaction, trust and customer loyalty in the petroleum sector of

Pakistan (Saeed, Rehman, Akhtar, & Abbas, 2014); influence on customer loyalty in Malaysian

petrol stations (Dutsenwai, Abdullah, Abdul Jamak, & Noor, 2015); Bus rapid transit (BRT) system,

gasoline consumption, and greenhouse gas (GHG) emissions (Aminu, 2016); determinants of

motorists' choice of petrol stations in Kenya (Mwenda & Oloko, 2016); technology acceptance

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model and motorists' intention to adopt point of sale terminals (Aminu, 2018a); Pump price and

petrol consumption (Aminu, 2018b); and fuel-efficient vehicles and petrol consumption in the

transportation sector of Lagos state (Aminu & Asikhia, 2019). Therefore, this research extends

the frontier of knowledge in the context of Nigeria's downstream petroleum sector.

The petrol retail market in Nigeria is fragmented and operated by major oil marketers,

independent petroleum marketers, and NNPC (NNPC franchisees and NNPC Mega) (Mordor

Intelligence, n.d.). Due to the growing number of vehicles on the Nigerian roads, the number of

petrol stations has increased significantly, thus giving motorists unlimited choices of petrol

stations to fuel their vehicles. According to the Department of Petroleum Resources (DPR) (2021),

there were 33,000 petrol stations in Nigeria as of 2021 (Asu, 2021). The possible consequence of

this is fierce competition among the vendors. Studies have affirmed fierce competition in petrol

stations (Dutsenwai et al., 2015; Patrick, Chenuos, Koskei, Kenyoru, & Tuwei, 2014). The

challenge of competition in the retail petrol market is compounded by the general low margins

earned by the operators. For example, retail fuel market in perceived to be a low margin business

(Australian Institute of Petroleum, n.d.; Reid, 2004; Tawia, 2018; Shosanya, 22). Finally, the Major

Oil Marketers Association of Nigeria (MOMAN) complained about low margins in the selling of

petrol in Nigeria, which is 11.5 percent of the pump price (Shosanya, 2022).

In light of the foregoing, it becomes extremely important for petrol stations to device a means of

achieving larger sales volume to maintain a reasonable level of profitability. One feasible way of

achieving this is customer retention. Therefore, scholars have used brand image, service quality,

and trust as antecedents of customer retention in a retail environment (Jones & Sasser, 1995).

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Therefore, the objective of the research is to determine whether or not brand image, service

quality, and trust can help Mobil Petrol Stations in Ikorodu area of Lagos State to retain

customers.

LITERATURE REVIEW

**The Concept of Customer Retention** 

Customer retention is the company's maintenance of the existing customers' base by establishing

good relations with all who buy the company's product (Kotler et al., 2008). It is effective in

reducing the maintenance costs per se and yielding economic benefits (Ang & Buttle, 2006).

Acquiring a new customer is five times more expensive than retaining existing customer. Firms

need to build long-term relationships with their customers to develop loyal customers and profits

(Athanasopoulou, 2009). A firm in an intensely competitive market will become a champion only

if it can convince customers to come through the door and also convince them to stay (Yves, Bart,

& Iris, 2012).

Generally, petroleum sector is a competitive market (Ogbunamiri & Agu, 2022; Dutsenwai et al.,

2015; Robinson, 2014; Saeed et al., 2014; Shongwe, 2012). In a competitive environment,

consumers will readily switch from one petrol station to another whenever they are dissatisfied

(Mwenda & Oloko, 2016). To avoid this, petrol stations have to satisfy their customers better

than competitors. Satisfied customers will become loyal customers and make the retailing

stations more profitable (Naveed-ur-Rehman, 2013). As consumers become more loyal to a

petrol station, they would spend more money at the station (Robinson, 2014). Therefore, the

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business world is now in the era of customer loyalty and not customer satisfaction (Soleimani,

2008).

**Brand Image and Customer Retention** 

Brand image is a set of association which is significant to the consumers (Aaker, 1996). It is a

consumer's perception of a brand that is formed in the mind of the consumer (Johansson, Koch,

Varga, & Zhao, 2018). Organisations work hard to build the brand image of their products.

Advertising and sales help to create a long-term commitment by the customer that increases

brand awareness and repeat purchases, and therefore, customer loyalty (Clottey, Collier, &

Stodnick, 2008). A strong brand image helps to keep the organisation in the mind of potential

consumers (Abbas, Islam, Hussain, Bagir, & Muhammad, 2021). Kakunu (2012) found that the

petrol stations' overall images are among the list of top determinants of the choice of petrol

stations in Nairobi Kenya. Nderitu and Njuguna (2017) found that improved outward appearance

of petrol stations was associated with strong consumer reactions and resulted in customer

retention in Kenya. Therefore, we state that:

**H1:** Brand image has a significant effect on customer retention in Mobil petrol stations.

**Trust and Customer Retention** 

Trust is another antecedent of customer retention in a number of markets, including retail petrol

market. Ranaweera and Prabhu (2003) described trust as a result of one-party having confidence

in a partner's reliability and integrity. Trust is a generalised expectancy held by an individual to

the effect that what another person says can be relied upon (Hsu, 2008). Over the years, the

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concept of trust has been widely applied in the field of marketing for both products and services

(Kantsperger & Kunz, 2010). Trust reduces transaction costs, improves organisation performance,

and creates competitive advantages (Wang, 2009). Trust maybe the single most powerful

relationship marketing tool available to a company (Berry, 1995). Customers that trust fuel

vendors will likely engage in repeat purchases and will be more willing to stay with the current

fuel vendors (Rashid, Asad, Naeem, & Muhammad, 2014). Danesh and Nasab (2012) found that

trust had a significant positive relationship with customer retention in Malaysia hypermarkets.

Patrick et al.'s (2014) research in Kenyan petrol stations showed that trust contributed

significantly to customer loyalty. Rashid et al. (2014) also found that customer trust had a positive

impact on customer loyalty in the Pakistan petrol sector. Similarly, Saeed et al. (2014) found that

trust and commitment significantly caused customer retention in Pakistan petrol stations. From

**H2:** Trust has a significant effect on customer retention in Mobil petrol stations.

the foregoing, we propose that:

**Service Quality and Customer Retention** 

Service quality measures the degree to which the service delivery meets the customers'

expectations (Yarimoglu, 2014). Despite the importance of customer loyalty, some retail stores

lack service quality (Dutsenwai et al., 2015). Consumers of fuel in Indonesia perceived BP and

Shell to be offering superior service quality than Pertamina, the state-owned retail outlets

(Permana & Balgiah, 2020). General cleanliness and appearance, as well as the quality and speed

of service of petrol stations in South Africa, improved the customers' experience and enhance

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customer loyalty (Bailey, 2011). Aminu's (2012) empirical research on relationship marketing and

customer loyalty confirmed that trust was an antecedent of customer loyalty in Nigeria's banking

industry. Kakunu (2012) found that service quality topped the list of determinants of the choice

of petrol stations in Nairobi Kenya. Kavitha and Sagaya's (2018) study established a positive

relationship between customers' perceived service quality and their choice of petrol stations.

Further, Nechipurenko (2019) found that customer loyalty in Russian gas stations was

determined by the quality of goods and services offered by the stations. Aminu and Adetona's

(2019) research showed that service quality significantly contributed to customer loyalty in

Nigeria's PayTV industry. Therefore, we hypothesise that:

**H3:** Service quality has a significant effect on customer retention in Mobil petrol stations.

Methods

The study was carried out at Ikorodu area of Lagos State, Nigeria. The study employed a survey

design, which enabled the researchers to obtain data directly from the customers of four Mobil's

outlets at Ikorodu - Mobil Akasoleri, Mobil Ogolonto, Mobil Ota-Onna I and Mobil Ota-Onna II.

Six hundred of 605 copies of retrieved questionnaire were completely filled and usable. The

research assistants appealed to respondents' sense of responsibility in order to get their

maximum cooperation. The participants were selected on the basis of their availability and

willingness to participate in the survey.

The research instrument, questionnaire, has four constructs - brand image, service quality, and

trust (the independent variables), and customer retention (the dependent variable). Each of

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these constructs is measured by a five-point Likert scale, 1 to 5. 1 = 'Strongly Disagree'; 2 = 'Strongly Agree'; 3 = 'Undecided'; 4 = 'Agree'; and 5 = 'Strongly Agree.' Each of the variables is measured by five items. The research instrument was pretested on November 18 and 19, 2021 with a valid sample of 40 customers of Total Petrol station at Odogunyan, Ikorodu, Lagos State, Nigeria. The purpose of the pilot study was to detect the flaws and biases in the questionnaire and adjust it appropriately to ensure that the contents of the questionnaire are valid. We used Cronbach Alpha to test the internal consistency of our scale. The Cronbach coefficients for each of the four dimensions are shown in table 1 in Section Four. Each of the values of the dimensions is above the threshold, 0.6, specified by Nunnally (1978), suggesting that the scale's internal consistency is satisfactory, thus reliable.

Data for the study were analysed using the Statistical Package for the Social Sciences (SPSS) version 23. Frequency counts and percentage were used to analyse the descriptive data while multiple regression analysis was used to test the three research hypotheses developed in the paper. All results of the analysis are presented below.

# **RESULTS AND DISCUSSION**

#### **Results**

Majority of respondents, 81.7%, were male while the remaining, 18.3% were female respondents; majority of respondents, 73.8%, were between the age of 31 and 50 years, suggesting that they are old enough to understand the importance of the research; a very large percentage of respondents, 76.7%, were married; an overwhelming majority of respondents, 80.7%, have at least an ND/NCE qualification, while 45.3% possess a first degree qualification or its equivalent, thus reflecting in the correct way they filled the questionnaire; due to the high traffic at both Mobil, Ota-Onna I and II, 84.8% of respondents were customers of these two petrol

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stations; and finally, 97.2% of respondents regularly bought petrol at least once a week at each of the four Mobil petrol stations surveyed, thus making them loyal to these outlets.

# Reliability of the Scale

The table shows Cronbach's Alpha values for all the four variables of the study: three independent variables and one dependent variable. The Alpha value for the entire scale is 0.875, thus indicating a good internal consistency of the entire scale.

The table shows Cronbach's Alpha value for all the variables of the study: Customer retention has the highest with 0.865; brand image, 0.857, trust, 0.852, and service quality, 0.855. Overall, all the items in each sub-scale in the questionnaire have a good internal consistency, suggesting that all items in the group actually measured each of the constructs. This is because all Cronbach Alpha values are in excess of a minimum value of 0.60 recommended by Cronbach (1951) and Nunnally (1978).

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#### **Hypothesis Testing**

The table shows that R square value is 0.570 which indicates that 57% of the variation in the dependent variable (customer retention) is explained by the study variables while 43% is explained by other factors not considered by the study. The study also shows that the correlation coefficient value (R) is 0.775, which indicates a strong relationship between the research variables.

The ANOVA results shows that the regression model is significant since the P-value 0.000<0.05 at 95% confidence level. This shows that the regression model is a good predictor of customer retention.

In testing the three hypotheses stated in the paper, the value of standardized beta ( $\beta$ ) and t-test statistics level of significance (Sig.) for each of the three constructs examined in the co-efficient table were used. As a rule, where p<.05, the null hypothesis is rejected while the alternative hypothesis is accepted. We accept the hypothesis because it is statistically significant, otherwise it is rejected.

**H1:** Brand image has a significant effect on customer retention in Mobil petrol stations.

From the coefficient table above, it was found that p-value for regression coefficient of brand image is given by 0.006, which is less than 0.05, so we accept the hypothesis. Therefore, the result of hypothesis 1 indicates that brand image is statistically significant and has a positive effect on customer retention for Mobil filling station for the sample ( $\beta$ = ·006, p<·05).

**H2:** Trust has a significant effect on customer retention in Mobil petrol stations.

From the coefficient table above, it is found that p-value for regression coefficient of trust is given by 0.000, which is less than 0.05, so we accept the hypothesis. Therefore, the result of hypothesis

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2 indicates that trust is statistically significant and has a positive effect on customer retention for

Mobil petrol stations for the sample ( $\beta$ = .000, p<.05).

**H3:** Service quality has a significant effect on customer retention in Mobil petrol stations.

From the coefficient table above, it is found that p-value for regression coefficient of service

quality is given by 0.002, which is less than 0.05, so we reject accept the hypothesis. Therefore,

the result of hypothesis 3 indicates that service quality is statistically significant and has a positive

effect on customer retention for Mobil petrol stations for the sample ( $\beta$ = ·002, p<·05).

**Discussion of Results** 

We used multiple regression analysis to determine the effects of three antecedents of customer

loyalty in Mobil petrol stations at Ikorodu, Lagos State. These are brand image, service quality,

and trust. The model was significant (p<.0005), indicating that the model is a good fit. The result

showed that brand image has the strongest effect on customer retention for our data set. The

result explains the reason why many customers patronise Mobil petrol stations across the state.

Therefore, the high customer loyalty enjoyed by Mobil petrol stations across Lagos state can be

attributed to the strong and positive impression that customers have about the reputable brand.

Mobil is one of the major oil marketers in Nigeria and a household name in the downstream

petroleum sector of the country. Motorists and members of public can easily identify Mobil's

name, logo, colours, and staff, and all of these elements can conjure a positive image of the brand

in the minds of actual and prospective customers. According to Abbas et al. (2021), a strong brand

image helps to keep the organisation in the mind of potential consumers.

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In addition, trust also has a robust effect on customer retention, according to our dataset. This

finding affirms the findings of past studies in this area (Danesh & Nasab, 2012; Patrick et al., 2014;

Ranaweera & Prabhu, 2003; Rashid et al., 2014; Saeed et al., 2014; Salah & Abou-Shouk, 2019).

The result also explains the reason why customers are loyal to Mobil. They have confidence in

the company's corporate and brand name, honesty, and reliability of the company's personnel.

They trust the reputation of the company and its personnel to keep promises. They trust the

integrity of the pump billing system and are assured that they are getting real value for money

every time they are purchasing petrol at Mobil. This result is instructive because there is a trust

deficit in the Nigeria's retail petrol market and customers are concerned about pump attendants

cheating them as they dispense petrol into their vehicles' tanks. Some callous petrol stations have

been shut down across the country for defrauding customers by the Department of Petroleum

Resources (DPR).

Finally, service quality also has a significant effect on customer retention, according to the

multiple regression analysis. The result also explains the reason why customers prefer buying fuel

from Mobil petrol stations. The finding suggests that customers perceived high quality service

delivered by the petrol stations. The high service quality endears the giant oil brand in Nigeria to

customers and makes them become loyal to the brand. This result affirms the findings of similar

studies (Aminu, 2012; Aminu & Adetona, 2019; Inderadi & Setiad, 2020; Jones & Sasser, 1995;

Kakunu, 2012; Kavitha & Sagaya, 2018; Nechipurenko, 2019). The result indicates that Mobil's

customers have remained loyal because the company has been consistently meeting their needs

by delivering high service quality. Mobil's spacious and clean environment; courteous and neatly

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dressed pump attendants; and speed of dispensing petrol contributed to the customers'

perception of high service quality offered by the company. The high level of service quality might

have contributed to customers' perception of the brand image of Mobil (future research can

investigate this relationship).

**CONCLUSION AND IMPLICATIONS** 

The Nigeria's downstream petroleum sector is regulated with fixed prices for petrol. Petrol

stations do not have latitude to charge prices based on the cost of importing, marketing, and

distributing petrol and other market dynamics in the country. Furthermore, the profit margins in

the market, like several foreign markets, are low, limiting the profitability of operators in the

market. These two conditions have made customer retention very important in the market. This

research examined the antecedents of customer retention in Nigeria's petrol stations. In line with

extant literature on customer loyalty, we examined three drivers of customer retention - brand

image, trust, and service quality - and their effects on customer retention. The research has

shown that customer retention in Mobil is significantly affected by brand image, trust, and service

quality.

These findings have practical implications for marketers and scholars. In business and marketing,

customer retention has significant consequences for a company's performance. Studies have

unanimously indicated that customer retention reduces marketing and operational costs and

increases a company's sales revenues, profits, and market shares. Knowledge of the antecedents

of customer retention will help managers of petrol stations to continuously implement strategies

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that will enhance the stations' brand image, trust, and service quality for optimal performance in

the market. For academics, the findings contribute to the knowledge of consumer behaviour in

an under researched downstream petroleum market in Nigeria. The research presents fresh

perspectives and findings on customer retention in the country's retail petrol market. This is

against the background that there is limited research in the petrol market.

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
